1. What is the Project looking to achieve? Who will be affected?

This project sits under the Southall Reset Programme, In July 2022, Ealing Council initiated the <u>Southall Reset Programme</u>. This programme is tasked with enabling a community-led approach to regeneration and investment for the Southall town centre and its surrounding neighbourhoods located in the wards of Lady Margaret, Dormers Wells, Southall Broadway, Southall West, Southall Green and Norwood Green. The programme will be focused on tackling deep-rooted challenges specific to Southall to support its residents and businesses to become part of a thriving Southall community and benefit from a more inclusive economy.

As a key part of the Southall Reset, is the Southall Active Travel project. The project aims to encourage and enable active travel, which means walking or cycling, and the use of public transport as a means of transport. It can benefit health and wellbeing by incorporating physical activity into everyday routine and can reduce the number of vehicles on the road and improve air quality. This should also contribute to delivering a more attractive, and prosperous town centre.

The high-level proposals envisage active travel interventions being delivered across the following wards: Lady Margaret, Dormers Wells, Norwood Green, Southall Broadway, Southall West, Southall Green. Those that live, work and visit these following wards will likely be affected by the proposals.

2. What will the impact of your proposal be?

There are likely to be a mixture of positive and negative impacts on protected groups resulting from the proposed scheme. Until the design is developed in more detail it is an initial screen of these impacts that is required, however it is currently thought that the impacts are likely to be felt on the following protected groups:

- Age;
- Disability;
- Sex; and
- Pregnancy and maternity

2. Impact on Groups having a Protected Characteristic

AGE: A person of a particular age or being within an age group.

Description

Old or young people are more vulnerable to road collisions and may face physical barriers when using active travel routes or public spaces. Challenges include level changes, lack of resting places and poorly lit, narrow, obstructed or poorly surfaced routes. Perceived risk to personal safety can also act as a barrier, for example, in poorly lit areas.

Impact - positive

Benefits are likely to be felt by school age children who should be able to more safely walk and cycle to school.

Benefits are likely to be felt by elderly people on account of improvements to public transport and improvements to walking routes, such as wider footways and safer crossings.

Disabled people should benefit from safer crossings, wider footpaths and improved surfacing of routes.

Any proposed cycleways would be at least 1.5m in width, which will support the use of inclusive / adaptive bicycles which may b used by disabled users.
