1. Evergreen planting to provide year round coverage and colour
2. Feature seating area
3. Herb garden in raised planters

Look & Feel

An evergreen planting palette will be established to ensure a lush green presence at Seaford Triangle all year round.

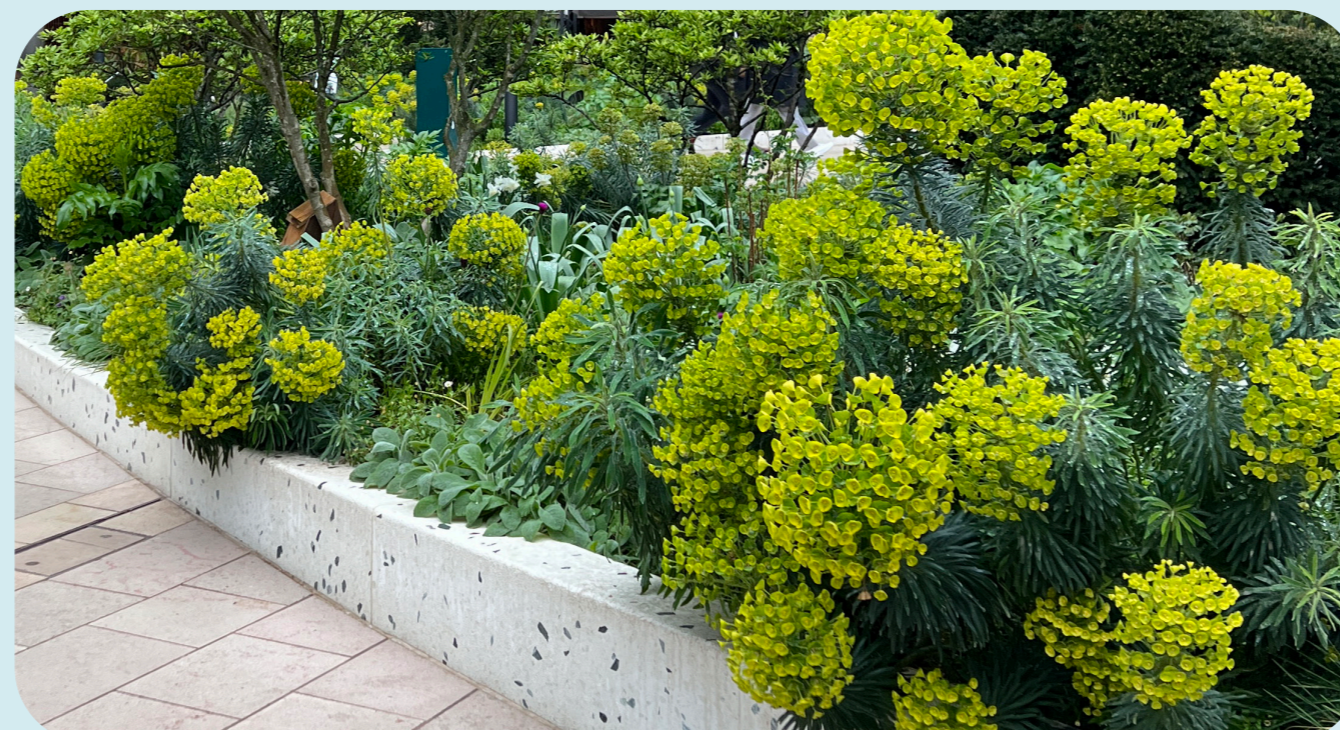
Plants will be low-level to ensure clear sightlines are retained across the triangle.

All species will be carefully considered to ensure a drought-tolerant and low-maintenance mix.

The scheme will also aim to increase wildlife-friendly plants to support foraging and habitat creation opportunities.

Look & Feel

A mixture of evergreens, grasses, and perennials will provide a variety of textures and colours at Seaford Triangle, ensuring a colourful, year-round planting scheme.

A feature seating area will allow residents to pause or meet up with friends, set against a green backdrop. Bug hotels will provide additional habitat opportunities for invertebrates.

Ramped access via mown pathways will enable the community to access the space.

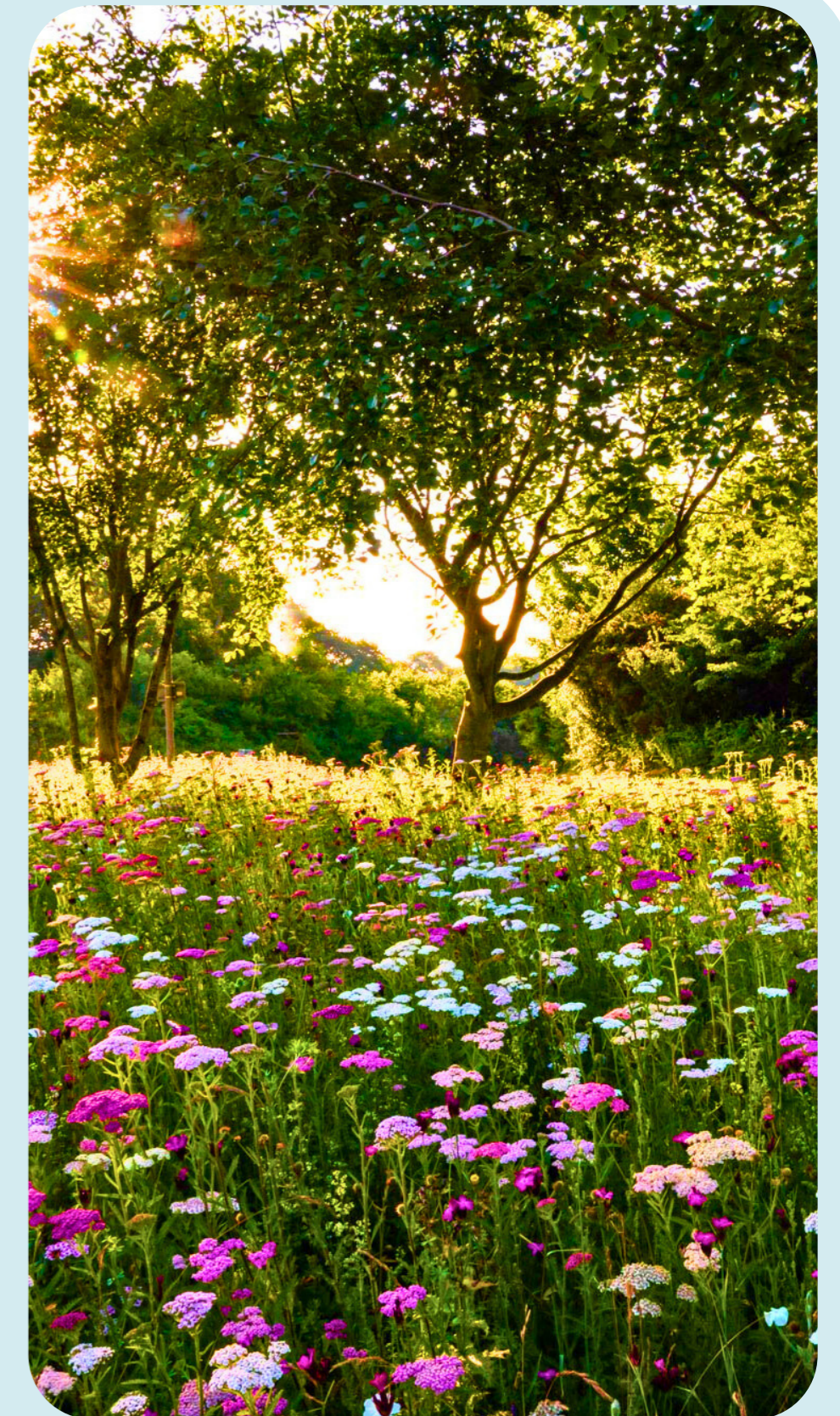


Key Planting Characteristics

3. Colourful wildflower mix
4. Feature seating area
5. Herb garden in raised planters

Look & Feel

The wildflower seed mix will create a vibrant and colourful display at Seaford Triangle during the summer months, providing a rich source of pollen and nectar for pollinators. The mix will be carefully selected to ensure a long flowering period, offering maximum enjoyment for both residents and wildlife. This low-maintenance option will require cutting back in autumn, so it can regrow in spring. Mulch paths will weave through the triangle, inviting people to explore the space, while multi-stem trees will add height and provide shade within the space.
